PRESENT TENSE

The Present Tense is used for actions that are happening **now**, as opposed to actions that already happened in the past, or actions that will happen in the future. There are four forms of the Present Tense: 1) **Simple Present Tense**, 2) **Present Progressive Tense**, 3) **Present Perfect Tense**, and 4) **Present Perfect Progressive Tense**. Below you will find examples to help you know when you should use each of these four forms.

SIMPLE PRESENT TENSE

The **Simple Present Tense** is used for **actions that happen over and over**.

Example: "I play tennis every day."

Singular	Plural
I play	We play
You play	You (all) play
He/she/it plays	We play You (all) play They play

Simple Present Tense = **VERB or VERB + -s**.

EXAMPLES:

- 1. I often *try* new things.
- 2. She *paints* lots of pictures.
- 3. We *drink* coffee every morning.

PRESENT PROGRESSIVE TENSE

The Present Progressive Tense is used for actions happening at this moment.

Example: "I am playing tennis today."

Singular	Plural
I am playing	We are playing
You are playing He/she/it is playing	You (all) are playing They are playing
Tie/site/it is playing	They are playing

Present Progressive Tense = am/is/are + VERB + -ing.

Examples:

- 1. I *am cooking* dinner right now.
- 2. The dog *is barking* at the car very loudly.
- 3. My friends *are shopping* today.

PRESENT PERFECT TENSE

The Present Perfect Tense is used for actions that started in the past and are still going on.

Example: "I have played soccer since I was ten years old."

Singular	Plural
I have played	We have played
You have played	You (all) have played
He/she/it has played	They have played

Present Perfect Tense = have/has + Past Participle (usually VERB + -ed).

Examples:

- 1. I *have lived* in Virginia Beach my whole life.
- 2. Heather *has driven* the same car for the last five years.
- 3. We *have worked* at this office for a few months now.

PRESENT PERFECT PROGRESSIVE TENSE

The Present Perfect Progressive Tense *emphasizes* that an action is happening now even though it started in the past.

Example: "I have been playing tennis all day."

Singular	Plural
I have been playing You have been playing He/she/it has been playing	We have been playing You (all) have been playing They have been playing

Present Perfect Progressive Tense = have/has + been + VERB + -ing.

Examples:

- 1. I have been watching TV all day.
- 2. Jennifer *has been studying* since this morning.
- 3. The musicians *have been practicing* for hours.
